Twelfth Sunday in Ordinary Time

But if you live in the presence of God, high above the deafening storm, the sun will always be shining on you; and deep below the roaring and destructive waves, peace and calm will reign in your soul.



"starboard" and "port"?

In the primitive days of navigation, the helmsman stood at the stern of the ship, controlling the vessel's direction by hand with a rudder, which was on the right side and called a steer board, or, as the Anglo-Saxons called it, a "starboard." The left side of the ship is called "port" because with the steering mechanism on the right it was the only side that could be brought to rest against a harbor or port.

Eucharistic Miracle of Kranenburg

In the Eucharistic miracle of Kranenburg, Germany in 1280, A sacred Host was thrown near a tree by a shepherd who was not able to swallow the Holy Eucharist because of an illness. Later, the tree was cut in half and a

perfectly carved crucifix fell to the ground. On the place where the crucifix was found, a church was built. That church is still there to this day and numerous pilgrims come to visit it.
