Pope St. Gregory was one of the most worthy and honorable men of his day, and he was praised for this throughout his life. Yet he was also known for his *deep humility*.






Loyalton CFF classes will begin on September 7th at 8:45 AM.

Please join the Bayly's in praying a Novena to Servant of God, Father Vincent Capodanno beginning Wednesday, 27 August- 4 September for the healing of little Kieran Bayly.

Fr. Capodanno served as a Navy chaplain with the Marines in Vietnam and gave his life on the battlefield while ministering to his men. I have chosen him for this novena because of his deep connection to the military and his fearless willingness to bring Christ's presence onto the battlefields of life, both literal and spiritual. His courage and selfless love remain a model for us all as we face our own struggles.

Prayer cards are available in the vestibule: one features a traditional image, and the other shows Fr. Capodanno on the battlefield, tending to a wounded Marine.

May this novena draw us closer to Christ and bring comfort and healing to baby Kieran through the intercession of Fr. Capodanno.

What is a Novena?

A novena is a nine-day prayer that you typically say to a specific saint for a special intention. Some novenas are said in one day, or over nine months, but typically you repeat them over nine consecutive days. Some people add on extra practices like fasting or acts of service to deepen their novena experience!

Here are some tips for how to pray a novena:

- ❖ Pick an intention for your novena, then find one that will help focus your prayer on that intention.
- Set aside a specific time each day to pray the novena. It's helpful to set a reminder on your phone or add it to your calendar ahead of time!
- ❖ Each day, find a quiet place to pray where you will not be disturbed.
- ❖ Follow the specific instructions for the novena you are praying, whether it involves reciting a set of prayers or meditating on a particular scripture passage.
- ❖ Repeat for nine days!
