



Let Us Celebrate With Joy the Nativity of the Blessed Virgin Mary, for She Gave Birth to Christ, our God, the Sun of Justice

Mary's birth was *ordinary*. The Gospels don't mention it. She was born in Nazareth, a city in Galilee. *No extraordinary revelation occurred*. The world focused on other events that would soon fade. *God's joy was hidden from men, who often seek extraordinary things*. *Only in heaven was there rejoicing on Mary's birthday. It must have been a great celebration*.

The Blessed Virgin *spent many years in obscurity.* All Israel awaited the handmaid foretold in Sacred Scripture *without realizing her presence*. Judging from appearances, she was like others in the small town. She had free will and love, but her love was intense. *Her desires aligned with God's love*.

She learned to sew and cook, and grasped the relationship between the wonders she witnessed and the prophecies about the Redeemer. She remembered and connected events in her mind's eye. **She pondered these things in her heart.**

Her vivid imagination fueled her simple genius in serving others. She made life more pleasant, especially during sickness or misfortune. She rejoiced in her mundane duties, knowing God loved her while she carried them out.



MILLENIAL SAINT: CARLOS ACUTIS

Saint Carlo Acutis was a remarkable young man who lived a life of faith, compassion, and joy. He is an inspiration to Catholics around the world and a reminder that **even the youngest among us** can make a difference in the world.

Carlo Acutis was diagnosed with leukemia at the age of 15 and died on October 12, 2006. However, his legacy lives on through his website and the example he set for others. Pope Francis beatified Carlo on October 10, 2020, and he will be canonized on September 7th, 2025 by Pope Leo XIV.
