The apostles made **three mistakes** in asking the Lord, "increase our faith."

t) They thought it would take a faith as **big as an elephant** to be able to command miracles.

2) They thought their faith was about the size of a mouse, smaller

than an elephant, but bigger than a mustard seed.

3) They thought they had **pretty good humility** for thinking their faith was only as big as a mouse.

Jesus didn't agree.

1) He says that faith is so powerful that even an amount of it much smaller than a mouse could move mountains.

2) He tells them their faith is even smaller than a mustard seed.

3) He tells them their humility was smaller than they thought.

In the parable about the faithful servant, who obeys his master's orders. He is an "unprofitable servant" because he does not bring the master any profit. **He did the minimum well, but only the minimum.** Saints see themselves like that - doing only the minimum, and themselves as sinners who need forgiveness.



The Parish Finance Council functions as a consultative body to the pastor. It consists of selected professionals to advise the pastor in these areas:

- 1. Preparation of the annual operating budget
- 2. Long-term financial planning
- 3. Annual parish financial report, which is submitted to the Diocesan Bishop
- 4. Annual and periodic financial reports to the faithful

Month of the Holy Rosary 15 Promises of Our Lady to Those Who Pray the Rosary

- 1. To all who shall recite my rosary devoutly, I promise my special protection and very great graces.
- 2. The rosary shall be a very powerful armor against hell; it will destroy vice, deliver from sin, and dispel heresy.
- 3. Those who shall preserve in the recitation of my rosary shall receive signal graces.
- 4. The rosary will make virtue and good works flourish, and it will obtain for souls the most abundant divine mercies; it will draw the hearts of men from the love of the world to the love of God, and will lift them to the desire of eternal things. A question asked of Father Pat in the St. Anthony Messenger this month was: Who wrote the peace prayer of St. Francis?

His answer: Clearly not St. Francis! Scholars tell us that the *first half* probably comes from a chaplain for William the Conqueror (mid-11th century AD). According to Dr. Christian Renoux, the *second half* ("O Master," etc.) was probably composed in France shortly before World War I.

Every shop in Assisi that sells that text on cards, ceramics, crossstitch, etc., sells it as **"A Simple Prayer."** Why is it linked to St. Francis? First published in France in 1912, it appeared in Italian four years later in the Vatican's L'Osservatore Romano. It was soon printed on a holy card featuring St. Francis of Assisi. **The prayer perfectly reflects what he taught.**

A WORD ON THE FIRST READING

Why does God allow bad things to happen to good people and apparently good things to happen to bad people?

Because God wants us to **wait** (for His plan to unfold) and **trust** (have faith even the size of a mustard seed).

St. Thomas quoting St. Augustine, says that "God would not allow any evil into any of his works unless his wisdom and power were such that he could bring an even greater good out of the evil." An example: the greatest evil ever committed, the deliberate torture and murder of God himself, which brought about the greatest good ever attained: the salvation of the human race.
