

THE EUCHARISTIC MIRACLE OF LEGNICA



The fact that the Legnica miracle happened in a church dedicated to St. Hyacinth (1185-1257) is significant. St Hyacinth was a Dominican saint who was devoted to the Eucharist and who also experienced a Eucharist Miracle. When the fierce Mongolian troops had reached the outskirts of Kiev, St. Hyacinth took the ciborium containing consecrated Hosts and was taking them to safety. He arrived at the back of the church and heard a voice coming from the Madonna statue near the altar calling him, "Hyacinth, Hyacinth. I see you're rescuing my Son, but you will not want to leave His mother in the hands of the desecrating barbarians?" He apologised saying it was impossible for him to lift such a heavy weight, but Our Lady replied: "If you had a little more faith and love for me, it would be easy for you to carry this burden." "I do not want anything but to love you and trust in you," said St. Hyacinth. Immediately the statue became as light as a feather and St. Hyacinth, accompanied by his fellow friars, miraculously crossed the wide river Dnieper and went unnoticed amid the Mongolian troops.

In St. Hyacinth's church in Legnica, Poland, during Holy Mass, on December 25, 2013, a Host accidentally fell on the ground, during the distribution of Communion. It was immediately placed in a container with water and closed in the tabernacle as required by code of Canon Law. A few days later, a red spot appeared on Its surface. The Bishop of Legnica at the time, Stefan Cichy, decided to establish a commission for a scientific analysis. The results were surprising, and confirmed that It had similarities to "human heart muscle with alterations that often appear during the agony.


The Rosary Angelic Form of Prayer

I was blessed with a Catholic school education. I learned early that my guardian angel finishes the rosaries during which I fall asleep.

Think about how close the angels are to the rosary, how much a part they are of each mystery.

It is archangel Gabriel at the Annunciation who first taught us the words of the Hail Mary itself. Angels are present in the Garden of Gethsemane and Garden of the Resurrection. Angels are depicted at the Ascension, the Assumption, and the Coronation. The "Glory be"s echo angelic words of heavenly praise.

Fostering Devotion to Mary

I. The first and most obvious way to grow closer to Mary is through habitual recitation of the Rosary.

- 2. Incorporate Our Lady into your spontaneous prayers. Ask for her help in your petitions, and for her guidance in your decisions.
- 3. Establish **spaces in your home that are dedicated to Mary**, such as a home altar with Our Lady's image, and visit these spaces often.
- 4. **Honor and venerate images of Our Lady** as you go about your day, whether it be in your home, someone else's home, in a church, or elsewhere. Use these reminders of the Blessed Mother to converse with her.
- 5. Embark on intentional pilgrimages to churches or shrines dedicated to Mary. It is an incredible gift to be able to travel to great Marian sites, such as Lourdes or Fatima, but not everyone is able to do this It is possible to make simple pilgrimages close to home. An afternoon spent going to the next town to pray in a Marian chapel is a great way to show devotion to Our Lady, and to grow in that devotion. Even a last-minute "pilgrimage" to one's own parish to pray before an image of Our Lady is of great benefit to the soul when done with fervor.
