## Thirtieth Sunday in Ordinary Time

#### Points to ponder about today's Gospel:

- On his way from Galilee to Jerusalem, Jesus went the long way around, through Jericho. Why? Our Lord knew that a man was waiting to be healed there. Jesus went out of his way because of his love for one person.
- Bartimaeus addressed Jesus as "son of David." Why? Although physically blind, Bartimaeus had been given the faith to see that Jesus is the true fulfillment of the promise made to David long ago.
- Many in the crowd rebuked Bartimaeus to be silent. Bartimaeus' persistence would be for the instruction and humility of the crowd. Wouldn't the example of this man, calling out despite their opposition, be seared into their memory?
- "He threw aside his cloak..." Bartimaeus reveals what we are all called to do: "throw aside the old man, our former way of life and instead put on the new self, created in God's way of righteousness and holiness of truth."
- Jesus calls Bartimaeus over to him and engages him in conversation. By doing this, the very first thing Bartimaeus sees when he opens his eyes is the face of Christ. Magnificat

# FAITH VS. FICTION - MYTHS ABOUT THE CATHOLIC FAITH SERIES

### Myth #8 - Catholics Worship Mary

- 1. **Catholics worship and adore God alone.** The type of honor we give to God—worship or adoration—is called latria.
- 2. The kind of reverence we give the saints is called **dulia.** This is a reverence that honors their holiness, exemplary lives, and closeness to God.
- 3. Hyperdulia is a special type of veneration given exclusively to the Blessed Virgin Mary. It recognizes her unique role as the Mother of God and the highest of all saints. It acknowledges her exceptional grace, obedience, and intercessory power without equating it to the worship due to God.
- 4. Veneration of Mary goes back to the earliest years of the Church. At the Council of Ephesus in 431 A.D., the Church defined the doctrine of Mary's motherhood of God, calling her *Theotokos* "God-bearer."
- 5. **Mary only points to her Son, never to herself.** Her glory is not in competition with Jesus; it never takes away from her Son, but only serves to show His power. We see this in the first chapter of Luke: "My soul magnifies the Lord..."
- 6. Catholics honor Mary as Jesus Himself honored her.

Relics

Relics are part of the body of a Saint, or sometimes an object that they owned or touched. These relics remind us of the holiness of the person and their closeness with God. Every altar in a church contains relics. Many miracles worked by God through relics were recorded in the Bible and continue to occur today.

## Three Classes of Relics

- **1st Class** items from Christ's life (like the True Cross) or part of the remains of a Saint (like a bone)
- 2nd Class items worn or recently used by a Saint
- **3rd Class** any items touched to a 1st or 2nd class relic.
