Thirty-first Sunday in Ordinary Time

In today's Gospel is hidden very short, but full of hidden meaning. "You are not far from **the kingdom of God**," what did Christ mean?

For Jesus there is always more. God is like the sea, and the words of the Word of God are like the swells and waves on the visible surface of the sea; and there is always more in the sea than what meets the eye on the surface, large leviathans lurking and looming beneath the surface. Similarly, there are large and moving meanings lurking and looming beneath Christ's words.

Christ came to earth to establish the "kingdom of God," and the Church is the kingdom of God. There are many definitions of the Church, but the two deepest ones are "the Mystical Body of Christ" and "the People of God."

- ❖ PEOPLE OF GOD visible, clear, personal, human

The two definitions should never be separated, but always seen together. The Church is both divine and human---like Christ himself.

When the best possible answer in words is given to a tremendously important question, as Jesus gave us in today's Gospel, there is always more than the surface.

FAITH VS. FICTION - MYTHS ABOUT THE CATHOLIC FAITH SERIES

Myth #9 - The Church Needs to Get With The Times

- 1. **The Catholic Church is indefectible,** that is, she will remain God's instrument of salvation until the end of time, and her teachings will never change. It makes no sense for us as Catholics to talk about Church teaching "changing" it never has and never will.
- 2. Assuming this is an insufficient answer for non-Catholics, it is worth noting that, 2,000+ years in, **the Catholic Church has a perfect track record.** She has never defined a doctrine she has later recanted, nor required her faithful to believe anything that they are not required to believe now.
- 3. **Doctrines are developed, clarified, and/or defined, but never invented.** For example, Our Lady's Immaculate Conception and her Assumption were solemnly defined relatively recently (in 1854 and 1950, respectively), but they have always been true and the Church has always held them.
- 4. **Customs can change** according to time, place, and among the various rites of the Catholic Church, **but doctrine never does.** This is why, for example, there can be a difference in the fasting rules between 21st-century American Roman Catholics and 9th-century Greek Byzantine Catholics—with no difference of belief.
