Psalm 146:7-9 and Mt. 5: 3-11

Remember how Fr. Brian was always saying "go back to Genesis"? Well, today Christ goes back to Psalm 146 to start his "Sermon on the Mount". *The Beatitudes are the Corporal Works of Mercy:*

Ps 146:7 "...who executes justice for the oppressed; who gives food to the hungry." *Corporal Work of Mercy:* "to feed the hungry; to give drink to the thirsty."

Ps 146:8 "The Lord sets the prisoners free; the Lord lifts up those who are bowed down." *Corporal Works of Mercy:* "to visit the sick, to clothe the naked, to visit the imprisoned, to bury the dead." Many ways to be 'bowed down'.

Ps 146-9 "The Lord watches over the sojourners, he upholds the widow and the fatherless." *Corporal Work of Mercy:* "to give shelter to the traveller."

Just opportunities to perform those "Holy Moments"!

Who was Zephaniah?

Zephaniah means "one whom God has hidden". He was the great-great-grandson of King Hezekiah—a prince as well as a prophet—and was hidden from the evil king Manasseh. He prophesied just before the Babylonian captivity.

Though most of his prophecy is dark, grim and gray, yet a light dawns when he looks beyond the time of punishment to a time of joy when God will "deal with all oppressors" (3:19), a time to "rejoice and exult with all your heart" (3:14).

The writer of the famous medieval hymn "Dies Irae" ("Day of Wrath") based his description of the Day of Judgement on Zephaniah's prophecy.
