Seventh Sunday in Ordinary Time

In the first reading, Moses urges the Israelites to holiness, that is, to bear no hatred in their hearts. How? By following this law: Love your neighbor as yourself.

The Psalm: **The Lord is kind and merciful,** tells us "As a father has compassion on his children, so the Lord has compassion on those who fear [respect] him.

St. Paul tells us we are temples of the Holy Spirit, and as such belong to God. "If any one among you considers himself wise in this age, **let him become a fool, so as to become wise."**

St. Matthew writes: **"Be perfect, just as your heavenly Father is perfect."** What a daunting command! To do this, we must realize we are not spiritually self-reliant and that true Christian perfection is possible only if it is given to us. When? When we return good for evil and love for hate. And go the extra mile and love our enemies. This will prove we belong to the Father because we are trying to be perfect, just as our heavenly Father is perfect, by loving our neighbor as ourselves.

Ash W/Ednesday

"Remember that you are dust, and to dust you shall return" is one of two sayings a priest may say when anointing foreheads on Ash Wednesday. The other is "Repent, and believe in the Gospel".

Ash Wednesday Liturgical Symbols and Guidelines

<u>Vestments - Violet/Purple</u>: Symbolize Penance, Sacrifice and Preparation.

<u>Ashes:</u> Symbolize the dust from which God made us. Also symbolize grief that we have sinned and caused division from God. Ashes are made from the blessed palms used in the Palm Sunday celebration of the previous year. They are christened with Holy Water and are scented by incense.

Fasting: When fasting we are permitted to eat one full meal, as well as two smaller meals that together are not equal to a full meal. We fast to practice self-control. Fasting is obligatory on Ash Wednesday and Good Friday from age 18 to 59. (See U.S. Conference of Catholic Bishops website for more information)

Abstinence: When abstaining, we do not eat meat. Abstinence is obligatory on Fridays during Lent.
