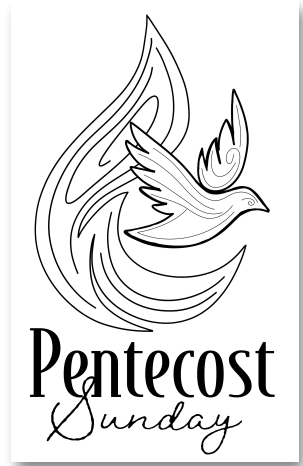

Where do the golf terms **par** and **bogey** come from? Until the introduction of the modern golf ball in 1898, an average score for any given hole was called a **bogey, the Scottish word for ghost**, meaning that the challenge was within the individual player against an unseen opponent. The modern ball took one less stroke to reach the hole, so the new standard was call **par, a short form of parity, meaning "equal."** Bogey was kept as meaning the original average with the old cloth-covered ball, or one shot over the new ball average of par. *~ Now You Know BIG Book of Answers*
