JESUS, I TRUST IN YOU

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THE WIDENESS OF GOD'S MERCY

My son's accident almost ten years ago—that left him totally disabled from a severe traumatic brain injury—has demonstrated the **Divine Mercy** is much, much greater that hoping that God will lessen the punishment due for my sins.

In the immediate aftermath of the accident, God poured his mercy out on us by totally protecting our hearts from any desire to cast blame on any one. That **gift** allowed us to **embrace the love and support our friends and neighbors** poured out without the poison of anger and suspicion to taint it.

As we moved through the seemingly interminable journey from ICU to outpatient therapy, God poured his mercy on us by reconciling us to the extent of John's disability. As we accepted that he would never walk or talk again, we saw that this demonstrated, as clearly as possible, that his dignity comes not from what he can do, but from who he is: a child of God, no matter how weak.

As we experience the stress and anxiety of caring for him at home, God pours his mercy on us by opening our hearts to **embrace our reality** - that we now are recipients, rather than dispensers, of charity. This allowed us **to accept the freedom of humility**: we are not in control, but we are loved, and that is enough."

Che Great Apostle of Divine Mercy

As a child, Helena Kowalska, dressed in rags and went from house to

house in her village to **beg** for alms for the poor.

The other sisters in her religious congregation turned to Sr. Faustina for counsel about their problems so often they gave her the nickname "The Dump."

Jesus revealed to her the Image of Divine Mercy in 1931 on the same day as the Eastern Catholic "Feast of the Triumph of the Holy Icons."

Sr. Faustina was the first Catholic saint to be canonized in the third millennium.

When John Paul II canonized Sr. Faustina on April 30, 2000, he also, on the same day, surprised the entire world by establishing Divine Mercy Sunday as a feast day for the entire church.

St. Faustina was born Aug. 25, 1905, died Oct. 5, 1938. From Marian Helper, Spring 2023

Why Is Today Orthodox Easter?

By the mid-sixteenth century the Julian calendar was out of whack with the lunar calendar by eleven full days. In 1582, Pope Gregory XIII made an eleven-day adjustment so that October 4 was followed by October 15. A system of leap years was designed to keep the calendar in line. Catholics adopted the Gregorian calendar, while the Orthodox Church continued using the **ancient Julian** calendar for celebrations of Christmas and Easter.

Eastern Orthodox churches continue to use the Julian calendar today. It is currently thirteen days later than the Gregorian calendar.

Since 1923, the Romanian Orthodox and Greek Orthodox churches have adopted the Gregorian calendar. However, they continue to use the Julian calendar for Christmas and Easter calculations. Now You Know Big Book of Answers

What Are Mass Intentions?

Mass intentions refer to the particular purpose for which a specific Mass is offered. This may be to honor God or thank him for blessings received.

But technically a Mass intention means that the sacrifice is offered for some person(s) living or dead. Also called the application of a Mass, it pertains to the ministerial fruits of the Mass. These fruits are both extensively and intensively finite in virtue of the positive will of Christ. Other things being equal, the more often the sacrifice is offered the more benefit is conferred.

Mass Intentions for you or your loved ones may be arranged in the Parish Office.

Plenary Indulgence for Divine Mercy Sunday Conditions:

- sacramental confession within 20 days before or after
- Eucharistic communion on the day, or the days before or after
- prayer for the intentions of the Pope

A **plenary indulgence** is a particularly powerful way to obtain remission of punishment -on earth or in purgatory – that would have resulted from sins that were **already forgiven**. It **covers all sins**, mortal or venial, that the recipient has committed up to that time, if the person sincerely repents, detests their sins and fulfills all requirements of the indulgence.
