Happy Feast of St. Patrick

St. Patrick, the **Apostle of Ireland**, is known throughout the Western world. **He is one of the Sacramento Diocese' Patron Saints.** He is called an apostle since he was the **first missionary to the Irish people**. And the Irish missionaries – both priests and women religious – were among the first missionaries to the church in California.

As a young man, Patrick was captured and **enslaved for six years**; he escaped, but felt called to go back to Ireland to proclaim Christ. There he established churches and primitive monasteries. Statues of St. Patrick can be seen at the entrance to the **Cathedral of the Blessed Sacrament**, as well as within the Cathedral, near the chapel of the Eucharist.

Third Sunday of Lent "It was about noon" John 4:6

Today's Gospel reading tells of Christ's meeting the Samaritan woman at the well. One phrase to ponder is "It was about noon."



Father Francis Martin explains some deeper meaning to this detail: It was about noon: the height of day, the sun is shining brightly, there is nowhere to hide. It is the same hour Christ will be on the cross, exposed and scorned for the sake of sinful man who sought to hide (Gn: 3:10). Yet is Christ who will promise: "when I am lifted up from the earth, I will draw everyone to myself" (Jn 12:32). It is the same hour Christ will tell the repentant thief, "today you will be with me in Paradise" (Lk 23:43-44). Christ's meeting of the Samaritan woman early in the Gospel prophesies his final hour, when blood and water will gush from his side, the well of grace that irrigates the Church and slakes our thirst.

Background on Romans

It is placed **first** among the epistles not only because it is the longest, but also because **it is the greatest.** It was probably written shortly before Nero's persecution began in A. D. 64.

Paul had not founded the Roman church, Peter had. But Paul came to Rome to appear before the emperor and to be martyred.

Rome was the center of the entire world, the greatest city in the world in power and population, but already decadent with slavery, political corruption, and extremes of wealth and poverty.

Romans is the book that sparked the Protestant Reformation when Martin Luther discovered the doctrine of justification by faith in it — Romans 5:1 [today's Second Reading].

St. Joseph's Feast Day This Month

Another saint devoted to St. Joseph is Bernadine of Siena. Born in 1380 and orphaned by age six, Bernardine was raised by his aunt. At the age of twenty he and some friends took over the management of a plague hospital, because most of the staff and died. Later, he joined the Franciscans, and was ordained at 24.

Bernardine helped to promote devotion to the Saint Joseph; he portrayed St. Joseph not as a venerable old man but as a young and strong, and diligent guardian of his family. Bernardine believed Joseph was assumed into Heaven. "We may piously believe, but not assert [as dogma], that the Most Holy Son of God Jesus crowned his foster-father with the same privilege which he gave his Mother." Bernardine composed a beautiful consecration to St. Joseph. He died in 1444 and was canonized six years later.



Why do so many Scottish and Irish surnames begin with "Mac" as in MacDonald, and "O" as in O'Connor?

One of the ancient Celtic traditions of Scotland and Ireland was (in much the same manner as for American slaves) that all the serfs who worked his land used the name of the clan chieftain. In Gaelic, the prefix Mac means "son," while O means "grandson" or "descendant of." Both were used to keep track of the true bloodline. MacDonald means "the son of Donald," while O'Connor means "the grandson [or descendant] of Connor."
